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
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

















Design aesthetics Handicraft Workshop in Action is an initiative that will enhance skills and aesthetics of women artisans in rural villages of Pakistan. The project will: upgrade skills of women in designing and color in cloth embroidery; increase their knowledge on the value chain and make market linkages; provide guidance on how women can work in groups; and develop women into effective business managers and organizational leaders. The workshop will invest in the training of the beneficiaries; identified as among most disadvantaged women in their communities, and offer technical support to link them with markets.



The workshop strategy so far has been according to the following plan; the structure and system of this workshop is designed in a way that artisans are able to enhance their product according to the market trends; able to increase monthly income and able to run their own businesses.

Improvements in quality, the creation of new designs, the development of the network of handicrafts production groups and life skills are some results of this initiative.




















The artisans were introduced to 'Line' and how the use of the line can change the design effect and purpose.
